

The application process has many components, but we will guide you through every step.</p>
<p>Pre-Departure Orientation</p> <p>Before you leave, you will attend a Pre-Departure Orientation meeting to meet with other STS students going on a high school exchange and to get a better picture of what to expect on the adventure ahead.</p>	<p>Welcome Camp</p> <p>Finally, you will attend a Welcome Camp (included for programs with fall start) where you will spend several days having workshops and activities with other exchange students to make sure you are fully prepared to start your exchange.</p>
<p>Living with a host family</p> <p>Wherever you end up doing your exchange, you will live with a local host family. It may sound a bit scary to go off to a new place and live with people you have never met before. But the host family often turns out to be the most memorable and meaningful part of the whole exchange for many students.</p> <p>Host families offer a behind-the-scenes look at the local culture and daily life, not to mention tons of opportunities to practice the language. But most importantly, your host family will be your main support during your time abroad. They will be there to help you with anything you need, to accompany you on your experience, and to provide a place to call home during your international adventure.</p> 	
<p>Your local support</p> <p>Throughout your exchange your host family will be your main support, and they will be able to help you with most of your daily needs. But you will also have a local coordinator and staff in your host country who will check in with you regularly and whom you can contact anytime.</p>	

Classic, Select and more

If anything characterizes our programs it's flexibility: choose from 21 countries, do a full academic year or just one semester (or even just three months in some locations), combine two countries into one year, choose your specific region, state, city, or even school! High School Classic

High School Classic is the traditional high school exchange program, chosen by most of our students. It is the perfect program for those who long for a genuine high school experience abroad and who are willing to embrace all the surprises it can bring. Based on your profile, you will be matched with a host family and school in your chosen country. You will also be placed in a grade level according to your age, language skills, and academic level, to make sure you get the best conditions possible.

In many of our program countries, you can wish to be placed in certain regions or even cities. So, if you know where you want to go, be sure to look for these options at your destination.

High School Select

With the High School Select program, your time abroad is entirely in your hands, as you can choose the exact school you want to attend. If you want to be able to take specialized classes (art, media, or an extra language, for example), want to play a particular sport or instrument, or even if you just want to live in a specific area, you will find what you are



Your home away from home

Living with a host family is more than just having a place to stay during your exchange. They will be your greatest support and your closest companions on your international adventure.



There is no better way to experience the local culture of your host country than to join a local family in their day-to-day life. And that is exactly what you will do. You will live together, eat together, spend your free time together, and maybe even travel together. They will be your first contact with a new culture and a place to call home in your new country.

And it **really is like gaining a second home**. Many of our students stay in touch with their host families long after their exchange is over. They travel all around the world to visit each other, spend time together and celebrate important life events. We have had host families travel halfway around the world to attend their former exchange student's wedding, years after the exchange ended. The bonds you form with your host family are sure to be some of the strongest, most meaningful, and long-lasting connections from your whole exchange experience.

Our host families come in many shapes and sizes. They can be made up of a childless couple, single parents or large families with children of all ages. They can live in city apartments, large suburban



houses, or out in the open countryside. They come from different backgrounds, have different interests, and lead different lives. Q How does staying with a host family work?

A You will live with a local family, which can be a couple or a single household, with or without children of their own. You will experience daily life with them, eat meals together, and have them as your main support system during your exchange.

Q How are host families selected?

A We visit and interview each of the families to make sure they meet official regulations as well as our own requirements, guidelines, and conditions. In many cases, we have worked with our host families for several years.

Q When will I find out about my host family?

A This depends on which country you are going to and when you apply. The earlier we receive your application, the quicker we can start the process of finding you a suitable host family.




Many of our students have told us that they met some of their best friends at local activity clubs or sports teams even before they started school! The exchange is the perfect opportunity to challenge yourself and try something new, something you have always wanted to try. Join a sports club, play in a band, learn a new craft, or learn a local dance. Whatever you enjoy, you will surely find something to suit your interests. What matters most is that you push yourself, meet new people and make the most of this unique opportunity. — **STS**

EXPLORE FURTHER*

- If you are on exchange in the USA you will have the opportunity to join optional trips throughout the year. Examples of destinations in the USA that have been offered before are Hawaii, New York, and California.
- In Canada, you may be offered to go on various trips. In previous years trips have been offered to Vancouver, Niagara Falls, various national parks, etc.
- In Argentina, you will be offered at least two amazing trips. Make sure to visit Patagonia – an unforgettable destination and a must-see in the southernmost part of South America.
- If you are on exchange in Europe, you will be offered to join various trips in your host country, but sometimes also to a neighboring country. Students in the Alpine countries may be offered to join skiing trips during the winter season.
- Students in Costa Rica will have the opportunity to join trips to national parks, volcanoes, and beautiful (surf) beaches.
- In New Zealand you will be offered amazing 11-day tours to the south and north island depending on when you are there.

Talk to your local coordinator about what trips are offered during your exchange.

Pre-Departure Orientation

Before leaving on your exchange, you will attend a Pre-Departure Orientation meeting along with other STS-students from your country. These meetings will help you make sure you have everything you need to be prepared and answer any last questions you may have.

Welcome Camp

To make sure you get the perfect introduction, your exchange will start with a Welcome Camp, which is included in the program fee (for programs with fall departure). It is a kind of "soft landing," where you will meet fellow STS students and learn a lot about what to expect from the adventure you are about to start.

The Welcome Camp takes place over a few days in a great city, like New York, Paris, or Cordoba, depending on your destination*. You will have interesting workshops and activities on different topics that can help you throughout your exchange: how to deal with homesickness, adapting to a new home, what to do if you need help or support, and more. But at the same time, you will also be exploring the city you are in, doing some sightseeing, and checking out some famous and iconic spots.

You will be doing all this with other STS students, all of whom are also starting their own adventures. It is a memorable experience every year, and the perfect way to get started. After the Welcome Camp, you will be ready to travel to your final destination, meet your host family, and get settled into your new life. — **STS**

Events

Life in the USA

The United States is a melting pot in the true sense of the word. It spans North America from coast to coast with a huge variety of landscapes, people, and experiences. From golden beaches and scorched deserts to stunning mountains and vast green plains, there is no end to the varied sceneries you can encounter. From New Englanders to Californians to Southerners, you will find that American society is dynamic and varies greatly from one place to another. School in the USA

The American school system is divided into primary and secondary education, better known as high school. You will attend high school during your exchange and most probably be placed in grade 10, 11, or 12, depending on your age and academic results.

Most American schools have a wide range of subjects to choose from, but the schools here are more than just places to get an education. They are social places with tons of different activities around which community life often revolves.


After-school activities



Life in Canada

This enormous country, the second largest by area, is characterized by diversity. With the longest coastline in the world and more lakes than all other countries combined, water is everywhere. The majestic Rocky Mountains and rugged wilderness of Canada's far north are also emblematic of the country's spectacular beauty, which Canadians cherish and protect with as many as 46 national parks. Banff and Jasper are the most famous, but wherever you go in Canada you will find protected natural areas full of exotic wildlife and unreal vistas.

Urban life in Canada is just as varied, with small farming towns, mid-sized cities, and cosmopolitan metropolises like Toronto and Vancouver. These towns and cities are home to famously warm and kind people from all walks of life, who combine their different ethnicities and backgrounds into a country that is at once multicultural and uniquely Canadian, where hockey is life, politeness is the national sport, and everyone has a bit of a sweet tooth.

The first thing you need to think about when considering a high school exchange in Canada is whether you want to go to an English or French-speaking region. Both languages share equal status in the country, so whichever you choose, you will likely be able to study both, but you can decide which language you would like to speak in daily life.

School in Canada

As an exchange student in Canada, you will most probably be placed in grade 10, 11, or 12, depending on your age and academic results. After arriving, you will meet with a counselor to set up your timetable and register for classes, usually 4 classes per semester.

Canadian high schools are globally recognized for providing high-quality education and are great for students with a variety of interests. They provide a wide range of course options in both academic and vocational subject areas, ranging from traditional course options in sciences, math, social sciences, languages, and humanities to electives that include the performing arts, culinary arts, entrepreneurial studies, outdoor education, and more.




After-school activities

Canadian schools provide a warm and welcoming environment for students that encourages inclusivity and student involvement. Generally many different extracurricular activities are offered, ranging from drama, robotics, and debate clubs to a wide selection of sports. Sport is very popular in Canada, especially hockey, and many students are involved in their school's teams. Most schools also arrange dances, carnivals, and other events for students throughout the year.

So, if you, for example, play ice hockey be sure to look for a school where you will be able to keep practicing and improve your skills. 



Q How is Australia as an exchange destination?





School in Spain

You will take a good mix of mandatory and elective subjects, but you will likely have the same classmates for most courses, so you will really get to know your group. Daily schedules can vary from school to school. Some might have class from 9 am to 5 pm with a two-hour lunch break (students who live close to school usually go home for lunch), while others might have class from 9 am to 2 pm, without a lunch break.

After-school activities

After-school activities are quite popular in Spain, including sports (especially football), gymnastics, music, art, and crafts. — STS



School in Sweden



School in Finland



Not only are these activities a great way to learn a new skill, but they are a window into the ways students interact and how society functions in Japan. — STS

Johan's story

Johan from Norway, on exchange in Japan



Q What were your expectations when you first came to Tokyo?

A I came to Japan with a vague idea about what I was going to learn and experience. I had heard stories from other exchange students that you grow and make a lot of friends, but I was not prepared to gain such a deep understanding of the Japanese culture, the people, and myself. I grew and learned more in 6 months in Tokyo than in 3 years at home.

Q What did you learn?

A I learned to enjoy my own company, about my hobbies, and who I want to be. The distance from my family back home made me realize just how much love I have for them, and just how much I took for granted. It resulted in a deep gratitude.

Q What was the best part of your exchange?

A That I have made lifelong friendships that I can call family. I have shared tons of amazing memories with people that I will always remember.

Johan's tips!

Try things you can't do at home

Do things that you can't really do in your home country, either it being some sports or some type of cooking, or anything.

Don't create too much expectations

Before you go, don't create too much of an image of what it will be like living abroad.

Learn to understand

People in other cultures often have a different way of thinking than you do. Learn to understand what that way of thinking is, learn about people, about humans, and you will grow a lot. This will also remove the anxiety or frustration that you probably will experience sometimes.

The process & FAQ

From A to Z. Begin at the beginning and go on...

Q Am I guaranteed a placement?

A We have a placement guarantee. If the unlikely event of us not being able to secure a school or host family placement in your chosen destination, you will be offered to choose an alternative destination, a full refund of the program fee, or the possibility to postpone your exchange.

Q Which grades are needed?

A Our students need to be achieving at an average to above level across all subjects during the last three years (or the years that they have received grades). If you have below-average grades please contact us and we will do an individual evaluation.

Q Can I choose where I end up?

A You have several options to have a say in where you end up on your exchange. If you choose the High School Select program you can choose the exact school, you want to attend. In the High School Classic program, depending on your chosen destination, you can request area, state, or city placements, but these cannot be guaranteed. If you know a family that would like to host you, you can also apply for direct placement.

Q Do I need to have prior knowledge of the language of the program country?

A English is usually sufficient to start with for most programs, even those in non-English speaking countries. For some countries, some knowledge of the local language is required. Be sure to check your destination's page for more detailed information.

Q What kind of school will I attend?

A In most countries, you will attend a local public school. If you choose the High School Select program, you have a choice of either public or private schools. Let us know which you are interested in, and we can help you find one that suits you best.

Q How do host families work? How are students placed with host families?

A Our host families are carefully screened and vetted. When a family applies to become a host family, we interview them, make background checks, and visit their home. Once they have been accepted, we present them with some students that we think might fit their family and lifestyle. Families

look at student profiles and read introduction letters before making their selection. To make sure that you are placed with a suitable family, it is important that you give as much information as possible about yourself in your application.

Q Can I arrange a host family on my own?

A Yes! If you have a potential family and school that would like to host you, you can apply for direct placement. We will still need to meet with the family and follow the same checks and procedures that are required of all host families. Host families cannot be related to the student.

Q When will I find out who my host is?

A Most of our exchange students departing in early fall, receive their placements in June–August, sometimes earlier. But since we want the host family to be active and choose their own student, we can never tell exactly when your placement will be ready.

Q Will there be STS representatives on-site?

A Absolutely! STS has area representatives or international partners working with us on-site. They are responsible for selecting host families, keeping in touch with local schools, and supporting you with everything you need during your exchange.

Q What happens if I am not enjoying my exchange and want to go home?

A We will help you and support you throughout your entire exchange. We encourage you to get in touch with your local coordinator or with the local office if you encounter any difficulties. We will try our best to offer support in every way possible to make your experience more enjoyable. We also conduct several surveys throughout the year to ensure our students are happy. Additionally, you do have the option to end your exchange early, but this should only be viewed as a last resort.

5 STEPS TO GET STARTED

Remember to be on time with your application because we have more applicants than spots. So, apply early to secure your place. Do not hesitate to contact us with your questions. We are happy to help and tell you everything you need to know about your high school adventure.

1. Interest Fill out the application on the STS website. We also recommend that you and your parents attend an information meeting to learn more and get your questions answered.

2. Free interview You and your parents attend a free, non-binding interview where we get to know you better in order to guide you toward the right program.

3. Application and preparations Once you have decided to go, we will guide you through the full application process including gathering a doctor's certificate and any necessary vaccines, writing a personal letter and/or making a video for the host family matching, getting signatures from your current school, and apply for a visa (when necessary). Based on your full application we will find a host family and school for you. You will also be invited to webinars and pre-departure meetings.

4. The Journey and the Welcome Camp To prepare you extra well, you will participate in a Welcome Camp. This is the first stop on your way to your final destination. Together with other STS students, you will participate in workshops and make yourselves ready for your new home.

5. The adventure begins After the Welcome Camp you will meet your host family and get settled into your new home.

Become an STS Host Family

We have students between the ages of 14 and 18 from all over the world who are venturing out into the unknown to learn, grow and make memorable experiences. If you are interested in other cultures and languages, consider becoming a host family. Welcoming a foreign student into your home is a unique and unforgettable adventure – an adventure you can experience in your very own living room!



Who can become a host family?

Our host families come in all shapes and sizes but share a passion for cultural exchange. It does not matter if you live in a house or an apartment, in a big city, or in the countryside. You can be married or single, with or without children, working or retired.

Here is how it works

Once you have been accepted to the host family program, you will be presented with several students. Based on their profiles and introduction letters/videos you can choose a student you believe will be a great match for your family.

We take care of all the practical matters.

All students have been well prepared in their home countries, and most of them have also attended a Welcome Camp at the start of their program. We also take care of the school placement, flight- or train tickets, visa, and insurance. You will be supported by a local coordinator, and we are available by phone and email. We provide telephone support even outside office hours for urgent matters. If you want to, you can also share your experiences with our other host families via a Facebook group.

As a host family, you give your student companionship, food, and shelter, and in return, you will gain a lifelong friendship and get a life-changing experience. The student will attend a local school and eventually come to have his/her own social circle and leisure time. Of course, it's great to make fun activities, excursions, or even travel together with your host student. But the idea is for the student to adapt to everyday life where the small details mean a lot, like cooking or baking local specialties together. Those things can really enhance the experience.

STS and Sustainability




